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**“ACCOUNTABILITY FOR CRIMES VS. HUMANITY”**

**ON THE 60<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF THE JUDGMENTS AT NUREMBERG**

October 1945 saw the opening of the first war crimes trial in history. The trail of Nazi war criminals held in Nuremberg, Germany, set the stave and the precedents for the many trials to come, some of other Nazis and others arising from conflicts in different locations: Yugoslavia, Vietnam, Bosnia, and Iraq.

On October 24, 2006 from 9:30 am to 1:45 pm, on the Grant Campus of Suffolk Community College (Sagtikos Building), the Suffolk Center on the Holocaust, Diversity & Human Understanding (CHDHU) will host a program that will explore the legacy of the Nuremberg trial, this being the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first judgments issued by the tribunal.

This event will feature presentations by Henry King, a prosecutor at Nuremberg; Joshua Greene, author of *Justice at Dachau*; Elizabeth White, Chief Historian and Deputy Director of the U.S. Department of Justice Office of Special Investigations; and Irving Roth, Holocaust survivor. The photographs of Raymond D’Addario, official photographer at Nuremberg, will be on display along with materials from the permanent collection of CHDHU.

Steven Schrier, Executive Director of CHDHU, sees the anniversary as an opportunity to remind the public of the events leading up to the trials and to encourage dialogue on how to prevent atrocities like the Holocaust. “Evil lives on in our world, even after the dire warnings given us by the Holocaust. We must not be silent in the face of acts of hatred,” said Schrier.
